Head Teacher speaker at a National Conference

FLOURISH OPENS ITS DOORS

A brand new post-19 specialist provision for young people with high needs 'Flourish' has opened in Knowsley.

The provision has been established by Knowsley Council, parents and carers, Knowsley Parent Carer Voice and Bluebell Park School working together to ensure Flourish meets the needs of learners.

This new SEND post-19 provision will enable learners who would otherwise have had to go out of borough to stay in Knowsley for further education. The aim is to prepare the young people for adult life in the local community and ultimately develop their independence.

There will be lots of involvement with local voluntary and community groups which the learners will continue to access when they leave Flourish at the end of three years.

Deborah Smith, Chair of Knowsley Parent Carers Voice and mum to Flourish learner Harvey, said

"I'm speaking on behalf of all the parents when I say even though they're young men, the thought of them going out of borough where they're not known, in an unfamiliar building with staff they don't know, and then after three years coming back and having that transition again is very worrying.

"Having Flourish on the doorstep with some staff they already know from Bluebell Park and in a building they know, we feel like we've won the lottery, it's just a dream come true."

Flourish is delivered by FACE - Knowsley Council's adult education provider - and is funded through the government Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA).

Flourish will deliver a three year programme and support up to four new students each academic year accommodating up to 12 learners.



INFORMATION, ADVICE AND SUPPORT SERVICES

KNOWSLEY EMPOWER JOB CARVING PROGRAMME

Knowsley's Empower Job Carving Programme is going from strength to strength and 10 local businesses and organisations are taking advantage of the benefits job carving brings.

The programme was developed by Knowsley Council in partnership with All Saints Catholic High School, Eastcroft Park Primary School and the First Ark Group to create meaningful and sustainable employment opportunities for Knowsley residents with a learning difficulty and / or disability.

Job carving takes less skilled tasks from different jobs and combines them into a single role ideally suited for a person with a learning difficulty and / or disability, which frees up time for other staff to concentrate on the more skilled aspects of their roles.

Once a job carved role is created, Knowsley Council produces job specifications in easy read and video format



making the recruitment process more accessible for potential applicants. Potential candidates have an informal meet and greet with the new employer and complete a work placement to see if the role is right for them. If the employer and the candidate are happy with the role created, the placement moves to a paid position.

Seven placements have successfully moved into paid job roles, three additional job carved roles are at the placement stage and we are working with a further three organisations to help them create job carved positions and placements within their organisations.

SEND Review

In their November 2019 newsletter, The Department for Education has announced that is has launched a cross-cutting review of SEND, looking at how the system has evolved in the five years since the Children and Families Act was introduced, how it can be made to work best for all families and ensure quality of provision is the same across the country.

It will conclude with action to boost outcomes and improve value for money, so that vulnerable children have the same opportunities to succeed, as well as improving capacity and support for families across England.
