## **Empower Job Carving film**

Media students from Liverpool John Moores University, Benjamin Cain and Emily Grannon, have produced a short film to showcase the innovative Empower Job Carving programme to support adults with a learning difficulty or disability into work.

Ben and Emily filmed the participants on the programme, as well as the organisations supporting the programme, to showcase the positive benefits it is having on both the individuals and the organisations.

Job carving works by taking less skilled tasks from different jobs to create a role ideally suited for a person with a learning difficulty or disability.

The film, which can be viewed on Knowsley Council's YouTube site (www.youtube.com/user/knowsleycouncil), aims to encourage more businesses to come on board to offer a supported employment opportunity through job carving.

## **DISABILITY AWARENESS TRAINING**

A free disability workshop was delivered to Knowsley Chamber members on 4 June to raise awareness of different learning difficulties and disabilities and how best to support a person within the workplace. Sue Temple-Fielding (Knowsley Council's Supported Employment Coordinator), Rebecca Berry (Disability Employer Engagement Advisor for Enable Knowsley) and Llyr Owen (Supported Employability Tutor for Knowsley Community College) delivered the interactive session to 35 attendees at The Village Hotel.

The workshop explored how our brains process information differently, specific learning difficulties, learning disabilities, Down's syndrome and Autism Spectrum Condition. The session then moved on to explore

different techniques that employers can use to support a person within the workplace and also the support available for organisations that employ a person with a learning difficulty or disability.
